Crossovers, which bring together items of cars, SUVs and minivans into one versatile family vehicle, are a hot commodity with today's buyers. They offer room and cargo space for an SUV without terrible fuel economy or trucks like road manners. The compact Nissan Rogue was brand new in 2014. Midsize Murano, on the other hand, was last redesigned back in 2009 and is set to be replaced by a new, third-generation model in 2015. Both Nissans offer a good combination of sedans as civility, competitive technology and safety features, and plenty of use for interior space. Rogue, the smaller of the two vehicles, measured 182.3 inches long, 72.4 inches wide and 66.3 inches tall, and has a 106.5-inch wheel base. The larger Murano was 189.9 inches long, 74.1 inches wide and 67 inches tall, with a base of 111.2 inches of wheels. Despite being a smaller vehicle, Rogue actually boasted a higher maximum seating position than Murano: seven vs. five. Rogue's seating benefit was due to the optional third-row seat, a feature noticeably absent from its stablemate equipment list. While rogue third-row seats were relatively small and suitable only for children, its availability was still a key point for the vehicle in favor of buyers with large or growing families. In contrast, the medium-sized Murano offered 31.6 cubic feet of cargo space with a mighty spot and 64.0 cubic feet with them folded down. Both Nissan crossovers came with a single engine and a pair of transmission. was powered by a 2.5-liter, double-added camera, inline-four with four valves per It is hooked up to a constantly variable transmission and produce 170 horsepower at 6,000 sr/min and 175 ft of torque at 4,400 sr/min. Power was sent either in front or, optionally, to all four wheels. Murano was motivated by Nissan's 3.5-liter V-6. The dual-added camera, 24-valve unit generates 260 horsepower at 6,000 rpm and 240 pounds of torque at 4400 rpm. Like Rogue, Murano came up with a constantly variable transmission and could have been with either front or all-wheel drive. Rogue had three finishing levels: S, SV and SL. S were an entry-level version. It came with 17-inch steel wheels, power mirrors with LED turn signal indicators, LED lights, air conditioning with rear seat openings, tilt-and-telescopic steering wheel, cruise control, 5-inch touch screen infotainment display, Bluetooth connectivity, rear-view camera and four-speaker stereo with auxiliary audio jack and iPod/USB connector. The mid-level SV Rogue has added 17-inch alloy wheels, a six-way power driver's seat, keyless entry and ignition, rear privacy glass, automatic lights, automatic climate control, six-speaker stereo with satellite radio and NissanConnect smartphone integration system. The luxurious SL Rogue added 18-inch alloy wheels, leather upholstery, heated front seats, heated mirrors, fog lights, roof rails, Nissan's Around View 360-degree parking camera, a larger 7-inch touch screen infotainment display with integrated GPS navigation, and a premium 9-speaker Bose stereo. Murano had four finishing levels: S, SV, SL and LE. Although it was the cheapest version of Murano, the Model S was almost bare bones. It includes 18-inch alloy wheels, fabric upholstery, keyless entry and ignition, rear privacy glass, backrest 60-40-split rear seat, dual-zone automatic climate control, 7-inch monochrome information display, tilt-and-telescopic steering wheel, cruise control and six-speaker CD stereo with auxiliary audio jack. SV Murano added fog lights, roof rack rails, automatic lights, heated front seats, color 7-inch information and entertainment display, Bluetooth connectivity, rear-view camera, automatic dimmer rear-view mirror, leather-wrapped steering wheel and improved stereo with satellite radio and iPod-USB connector. SL trim level added leather upholstery, panoramic skylight, heated mirrors, rain sensory wipers, heated steering wheel, power liftgate, driver's seat memory feature and nine speakers Bose premium stereo with hard drive-based digital audio storage. Finally, top-of-the-line LE Murano added 20-inch alloy wheels, a power tilt and telescopic steering wheel, heated rear seats, bi-xenon lights and wood interior trim. Rogue came up with a full up-to-date schedule safety features. It was a four-wheel abs, traction and stability control, an uphill and rear-view camera. All-wheel drive models were also standard with mount landing control. Control. Safety measures consisted of a lane departure warning system, a blind spot warning system, a Around View camera system – sl standard and a collision warning system. Murano offered almost the same series of safety features. The exception was around viewing the camera, which was not available for a larger crossover. Front-wheel drive Rogue received an EPA fuel economy rating of 26 mpg in the city and 33 mpg on the highway. The all-wheel drive version received an almost

identical 25-32 rating. The larger and more powerful Murano was rated 18-23 in all-wheel drive finish and 18-24 when equipped with front-wheel drive. 2014 Rogue had an initial price of \$22,790 for the S version, \$24,490 for SV and \$28,280 for SL. S Murano started at \$28,530, while SV started at \$31,620, SL at \$35,480 and finally, range-topping LE at \$37,970. \$37,970.

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
